My dearest Brother,

Had I only attended to my own feelings I should have written to you sometime ago for to express how deeply I had been affected at your illness and how happy I felt that it had pleased the Almighty to restore you to us, but feared to be troublesome by writing when you had so much business on your hands, but now that my Son the King of Württemberg has appointed Mayor de Schwenter his Charge d'Affaires at your Court I cannot delay recalling myself to you and recommending this Officer to your notice and protection.

He was attached to the Duke of Wellington during the last Campaign and since my

It gives me pleasure to hear that you intend  
my dear Brother to spend some weeks at  
Brighton before the meeting of Parliament which  
I trust will brace your nerves which I do not  
doubt have suffered much owing to the very  
severe trials we have met with.

I have been very much shocked this Morning  
by reading in the French Newspapers of  
the horrid plot the Radicals had formed  
to destroy your Ministers. I thank God  
that this wicked plan was discovered before  
any mischief had been done; and trust that  
good will come out of evil, as all wise and  
good Men, must feel the necessity of supporting  
Government.

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I am sure you will be glad to hear my dear  
Brother that Prince Paul has restored his  
Daughters to me and written in very proper  
respectful terms the desire we to take them  
under my protection.

I will now take up no more of your time
