Louisbourg March 25, 1727

My dearest Augusta

I hasten to express my most sincere
gratitude for yours of 14th which has both pleased and
overcome me more than I can express. The dearest things
affectionate message is most gratifying to me and I
shall certainly accept of his friendly proposal of
spending some Months this Summer in England
with Joy and gratitude but can say nothing
positive till I have seen my Son and spoken
to the Physician about Temack which is not a
Water drinking place one can go to in general in
the Spring as the Snow remains there after till
June. I will however see what Jäger says on
the subject and whether he thinks that I could fit

on my medical treatment which might enable me to be early
 on June in England and to remain there till the first
 week in October, for unless I can spend four Months with
 you it is hardly worth while taking so long a Journey.
 You will easily imagine my Joy at the hopes of
 seeing you again, and how highly I am flattered by
 our dear Brothers wishing to see me once more in this
 world, I am so deeply overcome by all these circumstances
 that I am afraid I do not do justice to my Heart
 but it is so full you must take the will for the
 deed. — Though I am a very stupid old Being I
 am a grateful one and shall certainly do all in my
 power to visit, but you know I am troublesome
 from not being able either to go in a short Carriage
 or walk. My breath being now so short that I
 must be carried down Stairs, as well as up Stairs.

this moment where I can think of nothing but
my enjoying the comfort of seeing my dear Mother
after a separation of thirty years.

I am sorry there is so little hopes of Lady Culthropes
recovery. --- In a few days I shall write again
and wish much to know whether I might meet

humbly ask your leave to propose my being lodged in
Mary's Apartment at Frogmore, as by that means I
should always be at my Brothers orders to drive up
to the Lodge but then I could enjoy a great deal
more of your Society than if I was any where else
and without being troublesome to our old Friends
