My Dearest Sister,
I am persuaded that you will not have attributed to want of affection or of feeling for your situation, the delay on my part in replying to your last letters, and my silence on the subject of the wish which you have expressed to come to England, and that you will do me the Justice to believe that I have not, for a moment ceased to be alive to your interests & to every circumstance which regards your welfare & comfort. The delay has arisen from the late events connected with the change of Administration, and in no less a degree from my wish to be enabled to communicate to you that the unfortunate Business which regards the Princip of Wales had been brought to a conclusion. - This I have now the satisfaction to say, is the case, and I trust I may flatter myself that the Question is set at Rest.

Directions have been given to fit the Armada Frigate for your Reception & Captain Lupton who commands her, will be desired to consult us far as the Law & our convenience by proceeding as near as possible to your actual Residence, and by giving you such timely Information as will enable you to take the necessary steps for the removal on Board the

Amable of your Effects and Valuations, by which Arrangement, all
Difficulty will be removed respecting the Insurance upon which
it had not been in my power to take any Step, as I have never
received any Catalogue of them.

I am sorry to say, My Dearest Sister,
that, notwithstanding the Representation which I made to Mr
Greenhill, and the Reading which he then expressed to forward
my wishes, he entirely neglected to take any Step in regard to
a Provision for you. I have however now put that Business
into the hands of the Duke of Portland from whom it will,
I trust, receive due Attention. — I have only to add my
sincere & warm wishes for your Health and safe Return to
this Country, and that I shall ever remain
