My dearest brother

All my letter can be nothing but thanks, which I most sincerely do for the pension granted to my Sons George & Augustus, I have received a lamentable account of William's finances by a Gentleman in his service he has wrote to you & I do not doubt of your goodness to him. There are some disagreeable projects that George intends that I will try to dissuade him from. For I fear that I have not the power to restrain him but by argument. if I have do let me know how I can set about it. forgive the liberty I take but I have not a human creature that I can consult on German affairs. I incline one that is come this moment, as you will see by the contents how much every body fears to be detect'd in writing to poor me. I ever am my dearest brother
