Dear Brother, 52348

The D Nobility having through a letter which was delivered to me Yeasterday by the same person, who carried their first demand to England, desired me most humbly, to back this Request to You, I could not refuse the doing it, though I fear, I go rather farther than it may be You approve of, the justice, that appears in their whole plea and behaviour, will I hope be a sufficient excuse for me. if that which they desire with so much warmth, is not intirely against the promises You have made, I join in their request to entreat <sup>by</sup> this means to forward this scheme for my Sons happiness. They will most likely not have the Courage to desire You to write, a few lines, <sup>Your self</sup> to Your Resident at Copenhagen to stand by them when the blow has been struck, as that is one of their greatest wishes,  
I take



the liberty to name it, particularly, as it is not  
to go through the hands of Your Secretary of  
State, and therefore cannot pass for a Ministers  
Act. I am ever Dear Brother,
