Gen. Conway with his most humble
Duty has the honour to acquaint His Majesty
that by letters he receiv'd from Lord George Lenoir
Yesterday every thing was then quiet among the
Troops of his district & the Embarkation of the
Two Regiments going on with no other interrup-
tion but from the absolute want of more money
for the payment of the Bounty, there being no Spe-
cie to be procur'd there. but on application to the

C. India's Directors G. Conway immediately
procured 2000 Guineas which he has sent
down by an Officer this morning.

There has been a slight mutiny among the
Yorkshire Volunteers particularly among the
Light Company at Wallingford, on account of
their claims to be discharged, having been insisted,
during the War, the mischief or bad consequence
has been understood ensued. G. C. sent down
an explanatory order as to their claims & situa-
tion. Also sent down Sir Tho. M. Dundas
whose influence, with the proper explanation
