

Procession on
the Princess Royalls
Marriage.

Mar 14th. 173³/₄

The Bridegroom and all those who attend upon
His Highness in the Procession to Meet in the Council
Chamber at S.^t Jameses Upon [March 14th 1733/4]
at Six of the Clock in the afternoon.

The Bride with the attendants upon her
Royall Highness, in the Great Drawing Room.

Their Majesties in the Kings own Apartment.

The Procession of the Bridegroom.

Five

Four Drums two and two

Drum Major

Eight Trumpets

Kettle Drum

Eight Trumpets

Serjeant Trumpetter in his Collet of S S and bearing
his Mace.

Those to stand next the Door of the Entry into the
Passage Erected, and when they come to the Door of the
Chappel to file off standing upon each Side.

The Master of the Ceremonies proceeding with one of the
Chiefest Officers of the Bridegroom.

Gentleman Usher to be Appointed by the Bridegroom
Between two Senior Heralds.

The Bridgroom in his Nuptiall Apparell invested
 With the Collar of the Garter conducted by the Lord Chamber-
 -lain and Vice-Chamberlain; And Supported by the Earl
 of Scarborough Knight of the Garter, and by the Earl
 of Wilmington Knights of that Order, being both
 Bachelors wearing their Collars.

The Officers attendants Upon the Bridegroom being
 Foreigners following by Pairs those of the Greatest Quality
 going nearest to His Person.

Upon the Entry into the Chapel Master of the Ceremonies
 with the Gentleman Usher and Foreigners to go to the Seats
 assigned for them, and the Bridegroom is brought by
 his Conductors and Supporters to the Stool placed for his
 Highness next Below his Majesty's Chair of State, His
 Supporters retiring to their Seats, Where they are to
 remaine according to their Precedencies among the Peers
 the Lord Chamberlain and his Vice-Chamberlain to return
 back to conduct the Bride and the two Heralds to
 return to perform other Functions.

The Drums and Trumpets likewise to return Back
 their first Station Without playing and then to play
 in like Manner before the Procession of the Bride, and
 to do the same in the Procession of his and her
 Majesty.

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Gentleman: Usher to the Bride between two Provincial
Kings of Arms.

The Bride in Virgin Habit with a Coronet Conducted
by the Lord Chamberlain and Vice Chamberlain and supported
by the Prince of Wales and the Duke both Bachelors Wearing
the Collar of the Garter; Her Train born by 13 Young Ladies
Daughters of Dukes and Earls Appointed for this Purpose
Those of the Highest Degree nearest her Person all Dressed
in White Habits.

The Prince of Wales Preceded by his Servants one and One in
a Line before Him

The Dukes Servants and the Brides Men Servants preceding
them in like Manner.

Unmarried Ladies, Daughters of Peers of Great Britain
preceding by Pairs; Those of the Highest Degree going
nearest the Bride

Peeresses of Great Britain preceding by Pairs in
like Manner.

Upon the Entry into the Chapel the Bride is Conducted to
her Stool placed Below her Majestys Chair of State and
Opposite to that of the Bridegroom.

The Prince of Wales and The Duke Retire Strait to
the Stools placed for them upon one side of the altar, all the
Retire

Retinue. Upon their Entry into the Chapel are to go to
the Seats allotted for them, save those who Preare the
Tram, who stand near the Bride, to perform their
Duties while the Marriage is Solemnizing; The Lord
Chamberlain and Vice Chamberlain return with the
Provincial Kings to Wait Upon his Majesty.

His Majesty Proceeds in this Manner.

Knights Marshall.

Preferivants.

Heralds.

Knights of the Bath not Peers in Collars of their Order
going by Pairs, according to Seniority, The Juniors
first, and if Odd in Number the Senior to Proceed
Single.

Privy Councillors not Peers going in the same Method
by paires.

S^r Robert Walpole. Knight of the Garter.

With his Collar Single

S^r Conyers Darcy Knight of the Bath in his Collar
proceeding Single in this place Appointed to him as
Comptroller of the Household.

Barons of Great Britain

Bishops in their Episcopal Habits are to go in this place
Except the Bishop of London Dean of the Chapel
and.

5 And the Bishop of Winchester Clerk of the Closet Who
before the Procession, are to place themselves in the Chappel
having the Liturgy in their Hands and to stand before the
Communion Table without the Rails

Each Degree preceding by two in Breast according to
their respective precedencies, But if the Number of either

Gentlemen Ushers

The Earl Marshal with his Staff.

The Sword of State Borne by the Duke of Montague
Knight of the Garter and supported by the Lord
Chamberlain and Vice Chamberlain

His Majesty in the Great Collar.
Capt. of the Guards having upon his Right the Capt. of
the Band of Pensioners and upon the Left the Capt.
of the Yeomen of the Guards.

The Lord of the Bed Chamber in Waiting.

Two Grooms of the Bed Chamber in Waiting —

Her Majesty preceded by her Vice Chamberlain —
and supported by the Lord Chamberlain and Master
of the Horses.

The Princesses Amelia, Carolina, Mary, Louisa, —
supported severally by two Gentlemen Ushers.

The Ladies of her Majesty's Bed Chamber Maids of
Honour, and Women of the Bed Chamber each of these
Degrees going by Pair's according to their Precedings
And if the Numbers of either Degree should be Odd, the
Junior of the Degree to go single.

Gentlemen Pensioners, who are to stand in the Passage near the Chappel hanging themselves there upon each side.

All Persons in this Procession upon their Entry into the Chappel retire to the several Places appointed for each Degree or Class, and none to remain upon the Haut: Pas save the Lord of the Bed Chamber in Waiting behind the King, The Lord who bears the sword, who continues holding it erect upon his Majestys Right hand, and the Lord Chamberlain upon the Left Hand of his Majesty having the Vice Chamberlain near him.

His Majesty is Seated in his Chair of State in the upper Angle of the Haut: Pas.

Her Majesty is Seated in her Chair of State on the other side of the Haut: Pas and the Four Princes go to the Stools placed next to the Duke at the side of the Altar (sic).

Her Majestys Lord Chamberlain Master of the Horse and Vice Chamberlain to stand upon the Haut: Pas behind her.

The Ladies of the Bed Chamber, Maids of Honour, and Women of the Bed Chamber to go to the Places assigned them.

Quarter King of Arms with the Herald's to a Place
to be assigned them:

During all this time and from the first Appearance
of the Procession, the Organ is to play and all Persons
being thus seated in their Places the Organ is to cease
then Divine Service is to Begin.

After the Dean hath given the Blessing God the
Father, God the Son, &c Their Majesties remove to
the Traverse erected at one side of the altar.

The Prince of Orange then Leading the Princess
they go up to the Rails of the altar and kneel upon
the Rich Cushions there Laid.

When the Dean has finished the Service in the
Liturgy the Married Couple arise and Retire Back
to their Seats upon the Haut-Par where they remain
While the Anthem is Sung.

The Return is to be in the Manner
Following.

- The Drums and Trumpets as before
- The Master of the Ceremonies with a Chief Officer
of the Pride
- Prince's Gentleman Usher as before with two Herald's

Prince of Orange supported by two Married Dukes,
Knights of the Garter (viz) the Duke of Richmond and
Bulland.

The Officers of the Prince and Foreigners attendants
as before.

The Gentleman Usher of the Prince of Orange with
two Kings of Arms.

The Princess supported by her Two Brothers Her Train
to be carried in the same way as going to the Chappell -

All the Married Ladies by Pairs. Those of the Greatest
Quality going nearest to the Princess.

All the Unmarried Ladies (who in the Entry preceded
the Married Ladies) are now to follow by Pairs according
to their Degree.

Then His Majesty in the same Manner he went
to the Chappell attended as before save that the
Heralds supply the Rooms of the Provincial Kings
who attend the Princess.

And Her Majesty in the like Manner.

The Princesses following in the former Method
When the Procession comes to the Door of the Kings
Leper Drawing Room; The Prince's Gentle Usher
and the two Heralds file off upon the side that the
Prince

Prince only May Enter and all his Attendants
 May likewise without the Door.

The like is to be Observed by those attending upon
 the Princess, and those who follow upon her Highness
 saving that the Prince of Wales and the Duke Enter
 into that Chamber:

His Majesty and the Queen with the Princess only
 Enter into that Room, and those who attend file off
 at the Doors.

Then the Prince of Orange and the Princess are
 to take the Obedience of their Majesties upon their knees
 Immediately after they Enter the Chamber:

All the People of Quality. (Viz) Peers sons, Peers sons
 Wives, and Peers Married Daughters, and People of
 Distinction, who go into the Chapel and do not Walk
 to come to the Privy Chamber any time before six of
 the Clock after which Hour no Person will be Admitted into
 the Apartments but such as Walk in the Procession

All the Men, who Walk in the Procession are to
 be Carryed into the Council Chamber.

All the Women into the Great Drawing Room
