Duke of Marlborough. July 9. 1726

I will beure to wait upon you at your chambers on monday at six a clock, ~~at the same~~ time. I send you what I have by me, that you may be pleased to look over them at your leisure but I don't send you the bill & answer (not having ~~them~~ by me) unless you require it, & in that case I can easily have them from Mr. Waller.

I send you of depositions on both sides, because I think they are fuller than in the case. I likewise send you a paper concerning a Deed that is the abstract of it, Mr. Waller being in doubt whether that deed will be proper to produce tho' it is proved his reason is because he thinks the other side may turn it possibly to our disadvantage but J. Com. Wearg thought it might be of use, so that it is to be consider'd of. I likewise send you two papers taken from the accounts, some sign'd

sign'd by Marlborough, some Marlborough
& Guidott, & others by neither, by which you
will see how many instances there are of Mr.
Guidott's bringing money to account tho' the Duke
of Marlborough sign'd the discharge.

I send you likewise another paper of my own
remarks which I sent to Mr. Waller after he had
made the case and I add something more to it
to day that is just now come into my head.
