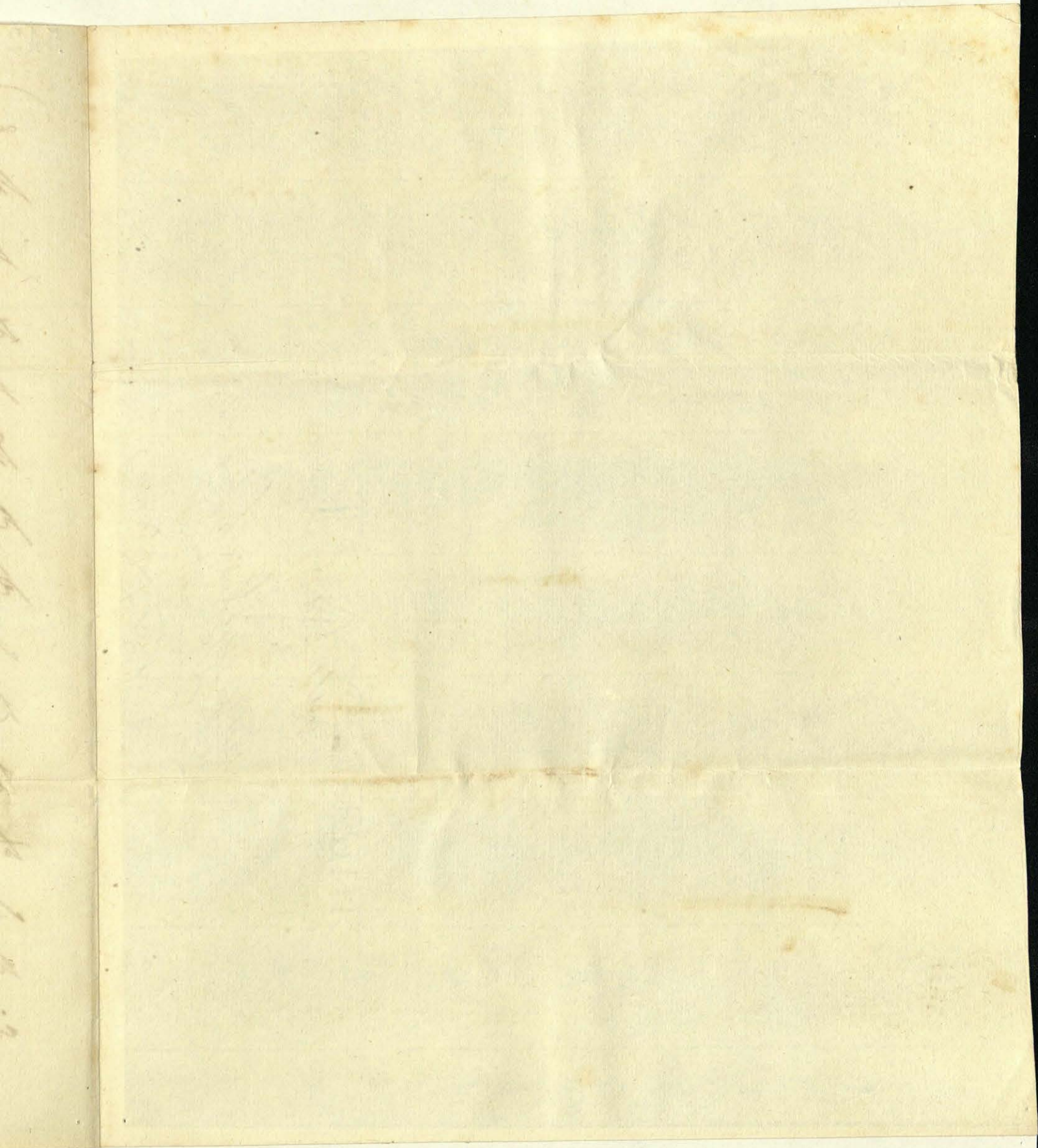

Richmond Lodge Dec^r. 17th 1766.
