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Sir,

I arrived here, last Saturday about two o'clock, and was immediately carried about 2 miles out of the town to Fredericberg, where the court is. I found my sister pretty well, and really very glad to see me again. I think she is grown taller, but also larger. We go all together to day for a few days, farther into the country to visit the two Old Queens, and Prince Frederick, who has just been inoculated according to Sutton's method, but it is not yet come out, tho' it is full 10 days since. When we return there they are to come into town for to celebrate the Queen's birthday, which is also to be followed by other days amusements. The King desires me to dine, and ^{with} sup ^{there} every day, which till now I have done. I had a very pleasant sail, in a very good ship indeed; they seem to follow much our style

of working, in their shifts, I luckily had
two or 3 Officers on board, who had
served with us in the Spanish War. We
are to dine on board the fleet next Saturday,
for that is the usual day for that Expedition,
and they are as much Billerie here, as at
Carlton house. Some day next week there is
to be a review of all the Garrison. As to the
Ladies here, they are by much the most
disagreeable I ever saw, as to conversation Ly: Bodd
is a pride, and ~~diffidence~~, and these Ladies
of the town in London, are Destals in Company.
They are added to that little pale faced creature.
The poor Queen is quite distressed about their
behaviour, but does not know how to help
herself. The look of the town, and country
about it is very pretty. I have not yet had time
to go regularly round the town, but it seems to
be very defensible. There is now in the road

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of Copenhagen 8 ships of the Line, and 3 frigates,
in very good condition, and order. I have not
yet named positively the time to the Queen
I mean to go, but I think it will be about the
28th. I hope Sir the Queen, and Your Majesty
are quite well.
