I cannot let my friend S^r Henry Clinton return to England without troubling you with a few lines, to recommend him to your Protection, I am sure you will find him an Able, and an Honorable Man, and I must say, he has been very ill used. My Great Regard for him may appear partiality, but if ever you should honor him with some Conversation I believe you will be satisfied.

I did desire it to be hinted to you Sir in a letter to Mrs Fitzherbert, that I did ^{not} offer any of my houses to you; but as it had been said possibly you would not inhabit Carlton house this Winter, I flattered myself that you would prefer Upper Grosvenor Street to any other
