Sir,

On my Arrival at Cumberland house, I found
the Prince of Wales. He tryed to enter upon a
variety of Subjects, which I evaded as well as I could.
But upon his pressing me hard, I did venture to say
that I thought any Application from Him, or any
One, would be highly improper. Yet I rather fancy
the Duke of York is to be sent to Windsor tomorrow.
He to my astonishment, went quite alone to the
great Lodge, at 7^o clock this evening, with orders
not to be followed by any body. I find there was
a Will, which the Prince wished to be opened
Lady Elizabeth had it. I agreed to its being opened,
as I found it was left in town on purpose. The Prince
read it, it was dated in 77. merely appointing Her
Majesty. I recommend the paper being put

into M. General Gault's hands, who was also
present.

I mean to go to Hampton Court
tomorrow.
