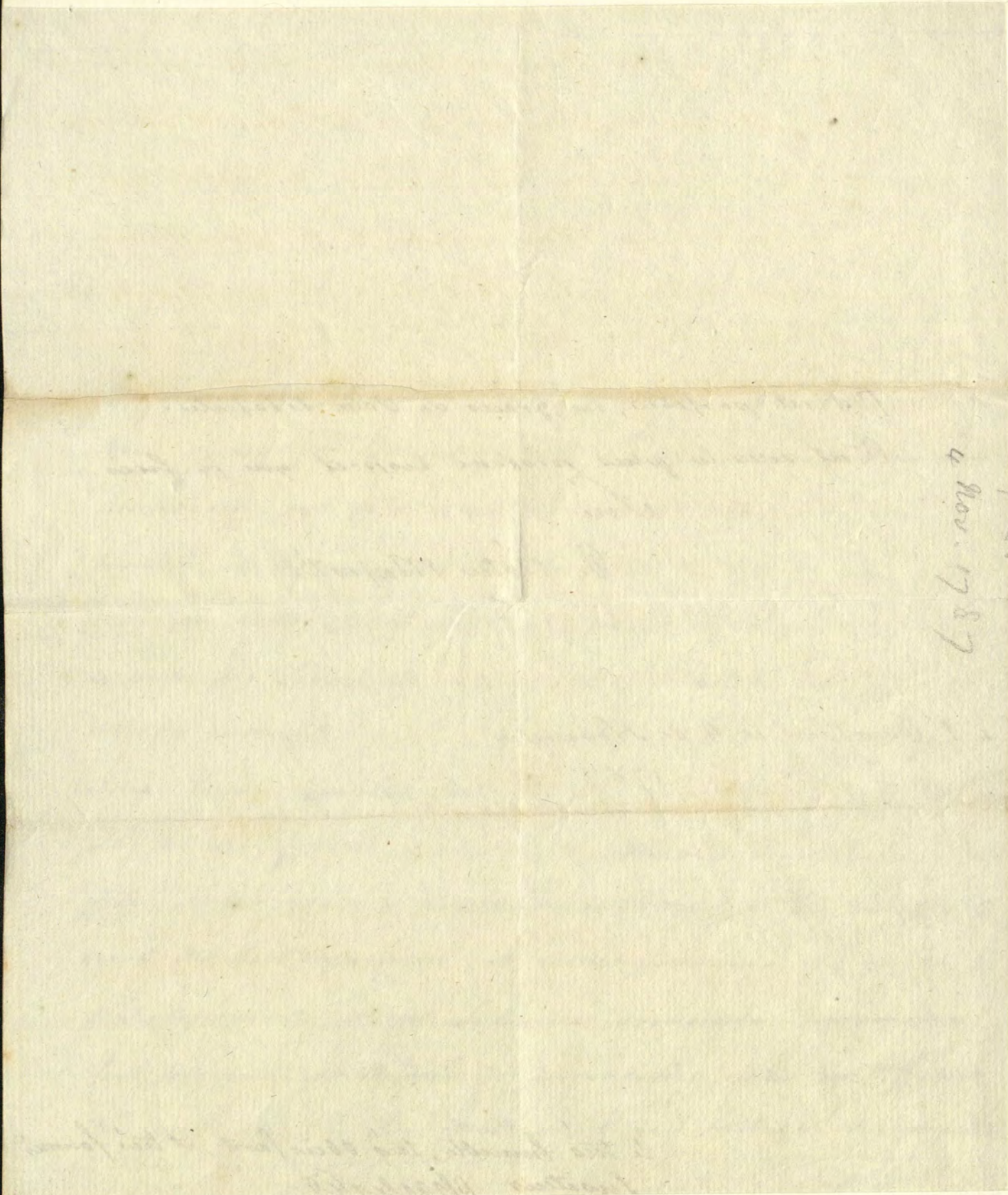

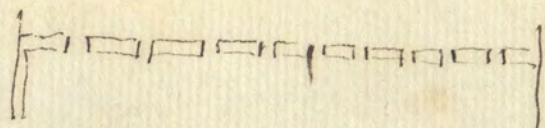

Sir

A messenger is this moment arriv'd from Ireland with the enclosed dispatch upon the subject of the prorogation of the Parliament; & as the contrary winds have detained this communication so long, I have ventured to trespass upon your Majesty's time to request your commands upon it, that they may be conveyed to the Lords Justices without delay; & if your Majesty sees no objection to the day proposed, viz Thursday the 07th of January, I will give the necessary directions accordingly.

The dispatch marked "Military" seems to prop some immediate arrangement for the new establishment; and as I have been honour'd with your Majesty's commands upon that head, I would humbly recommend that the necessary orders should be given for putting the regiments of Infantry in Ireland upon the same establishment as those of

Great Britain without delay, & by that means the difficulty
adverted to in the dispatch will be avoided. The arrangements
respecting the cavalry, need not take place till the idea has
been opened in this Kingdom; unless your Majesty should
otherwise direct. & if I should receive your commands
to issue those orders, they may be given in the same form
as those which were dated from the War Office on the 29th
November, a copy of which has been transmitted to me.

I have likewise ventured to trouble your Majesty with
the list of officers from the British establishment for whom
I would humbly request your Majesty's leave of absence,
that they may attend me as *lidi du Camp*. Lt. Col. Loftus
does not desire to be exempted from doing his regimental
duty in England, & has particularly requested that this
might be humbly stated to your Majesty.

I would not have trespassed upon your Majesty's time thus
far, but that I propose in obedience to your orders to

leave London either tomorrow night, or Wednesday morning.

Mr Pitt humbly presumes to acquaint your Majesty that a long Debate took Place to Day in the Committee of Supply on the Army Estimates. - The Objection taken was to the Augmentation in the Plantation Estimate, and the Debate turned chiefly on the Force to be sent to the West Indies, tho' with some slight Opposition to the new Establishment of the Regiments - On a Division the original Motion was carried by 242 to 80. - The Ordnance Estimate was afterwards voted after a short Debate.
