attending in your Majesty's Gracious person on all  
Military Reviews, as well as private Rides during  
these unhappy Contentions: I also beg leave to  
Recommend to your Majesty to order that the  
strictest attention be paid to the Irish Coasts this  
ensuing Spring, as also to keep a close look out

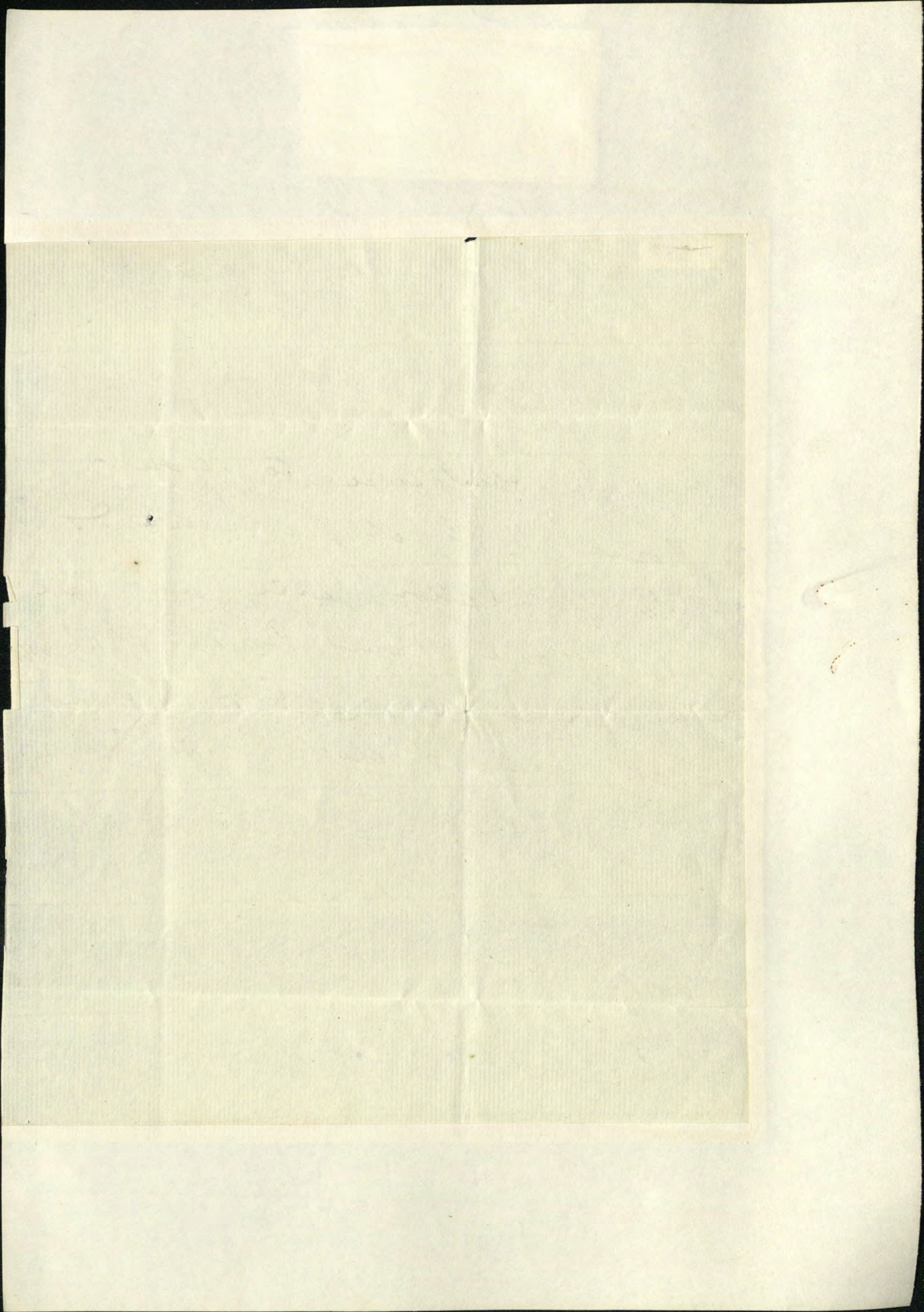
