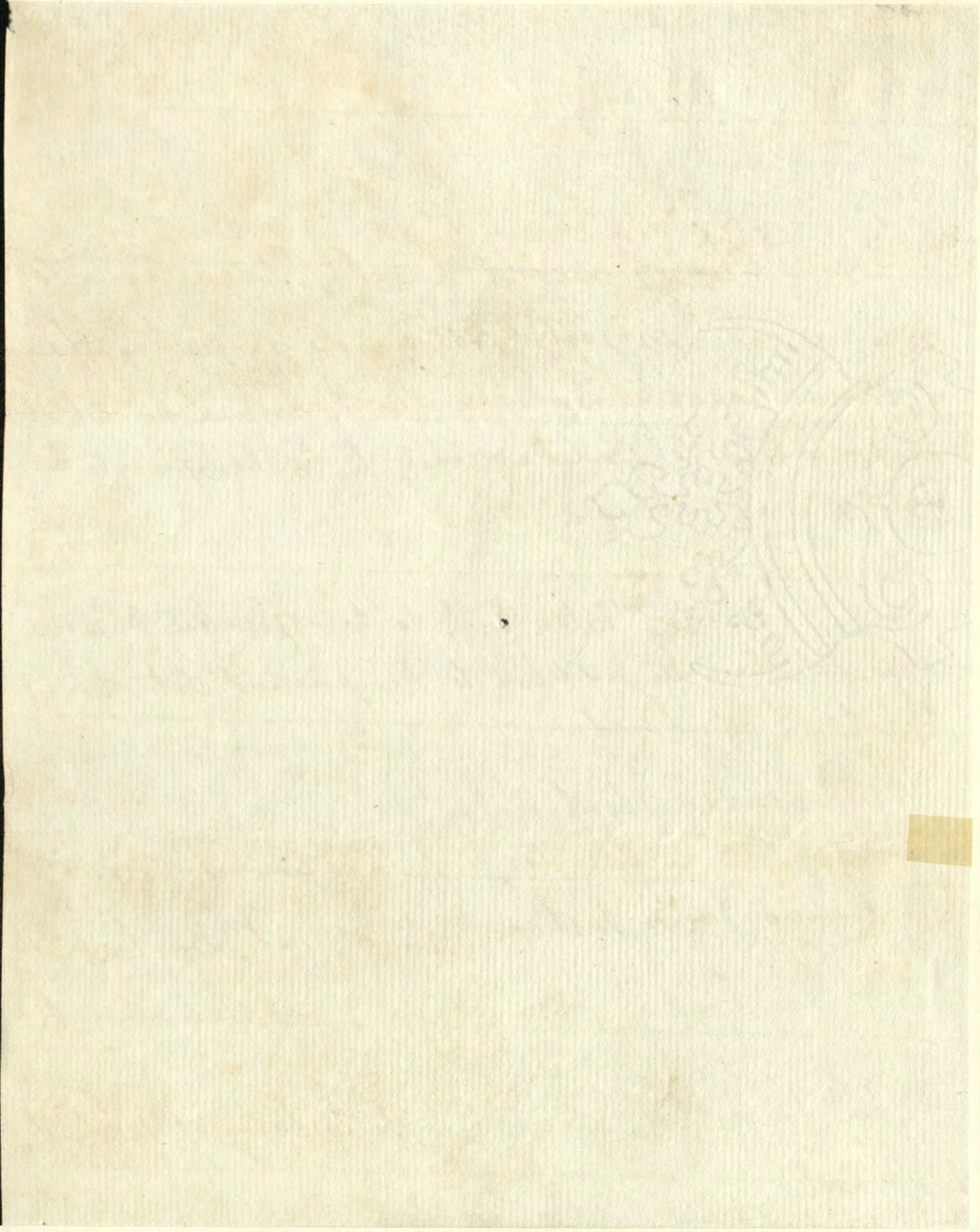

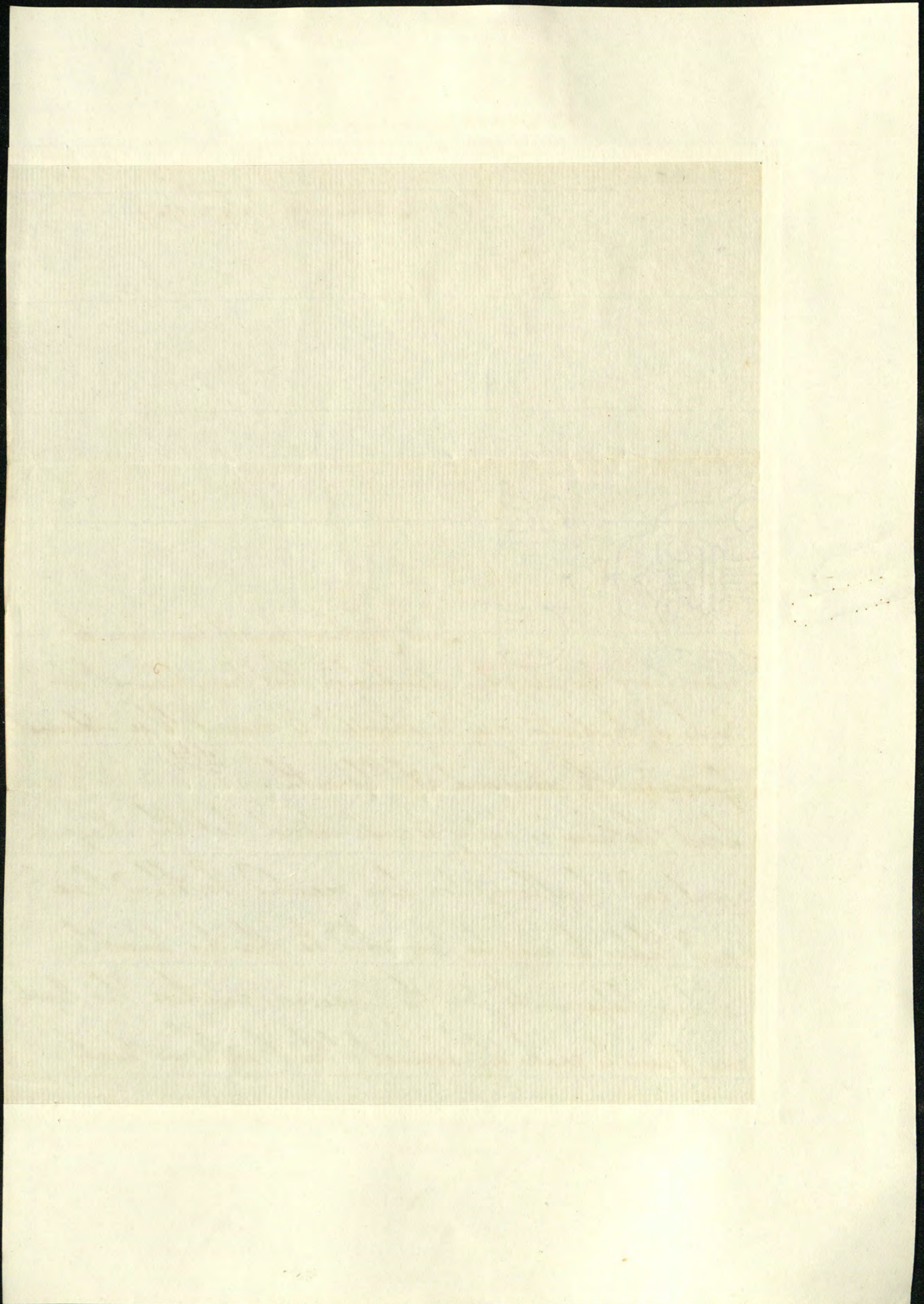

Your Majesty was pleased to
ask, whether Mr Mitford was
the only Person proposed for the
office of King's Counsel. It has
since occurred to the Chancellor,
that, possibly, your Majesty might
have some other Person in
contemplation; which it was an
omission not to enquire. If that
were so, he humbly asks your
Majesty's Pardon for the omission;
and begs to know your Majesty's
Pleasure; that the proper Instrument
may be forwarded forthwith for
your Majesty's signature.

In the mean time He has
recollected, that, as it was not your
Majesty's pleasure, that a new Judge
should be put over the head of
Mr Lloyd, It would also be
inconvenient, that the second
Judge should have precedence of
the first. He therefore presumes
to submit to your Majesty's
consideration the appointment of
Mr Lloyd to be one of your
Majesty's Counsel. and, as the
time for issuing the Precept is
nearer, than He had foreseen,
He has also presumed to lay before

Your Majesty the appointments
of both to be of your Majesty's
Council: that, if it should be
your Majesty's Pleasure to
make both appointments, they
may be signed at the same
time; or, otherwise, that of Mr
Mitford; for which only the
Chancellor has yet received your
Majesty's commands.

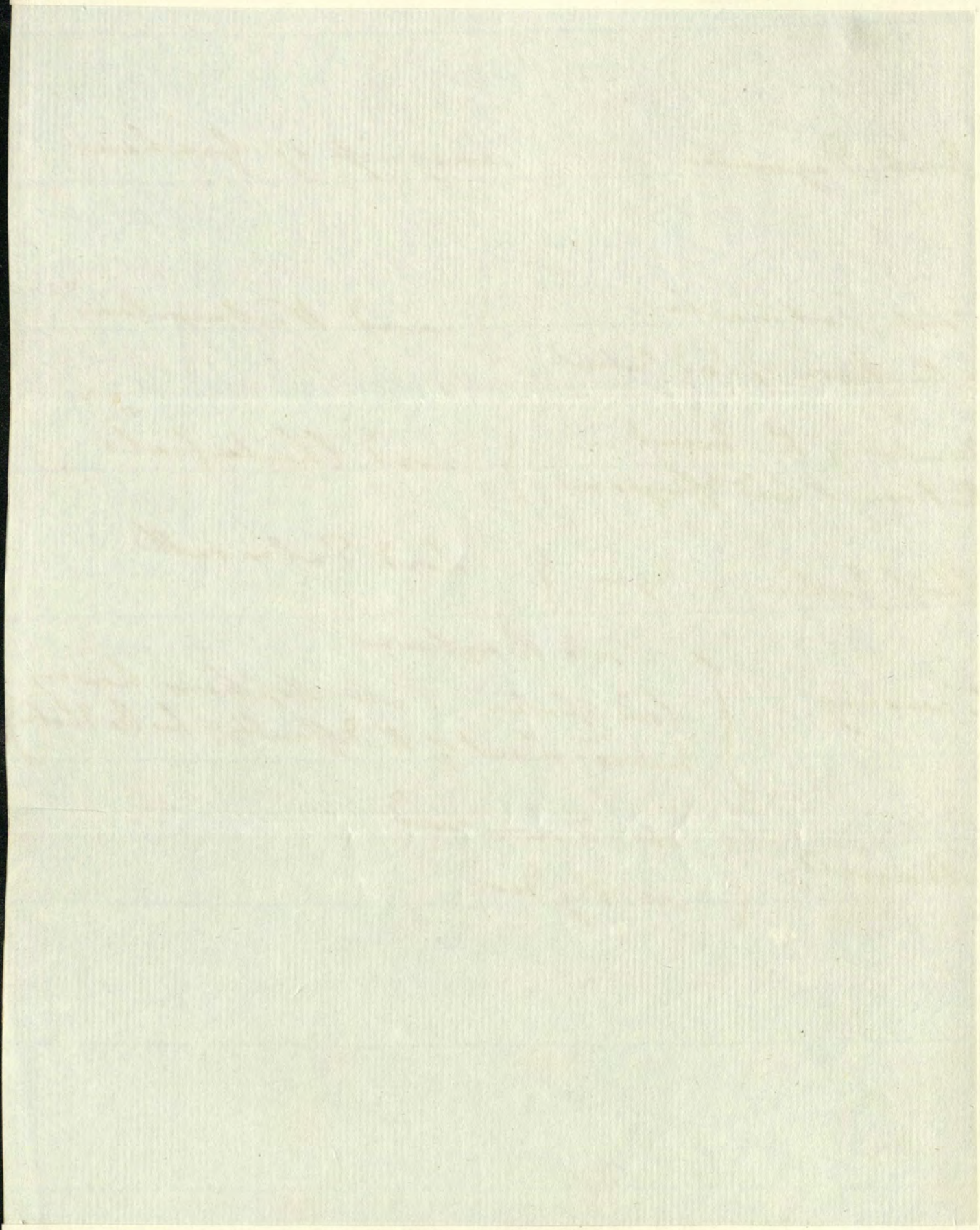
