Sir

Poor Princess Mary is con-  
-valescing under the influence of a  
heavy cold - as is also Mr. Fitzgibbon  
and Mr. Augustus - I have the pleas-  
-ure therefore of trying to supply the  
Royal Highness, kind care to give  
you information of what has passed.

The day has been a more quiet  
one than we expected after the hard  
C<sup>o</sup>'s visit - The King has alluded  
to it, & seemed to feel it sufficiently -  
but has not complained - and I  
only hope that the impression  
which has been made upon His  
Majesty's mind by the repeated  
appearances he has received of the

Princess of Wales; affectionate and  
prudent conduct may have had  
its influence in reconciling the  
King to what he has heard -

I have noticed the delusion  
once - but only once -

We had further questions from  
the Chancellor & L<sup>d</sup> Liverpool,  
but nothing striking - nor  
half so much to the purpose  
as those proposed by the  
Prince's command -
